

Summer Project - North Myrtle Beach (NMB), SC

In a popular tourist location that thousands of families and graduating high school seniors frequent during the summer months. ni a popular tourist location that triousarius or rainines and graduating riigh scriptor serious request charry the summer risorius, ninety-six students and twenty-six staff entered into a summer adventure that would impact not only their own lives, but the lives of those they interacted with. I got the privilege of being one of those staff this summer and the blessing of pouring my heart and my efforts, by the power of the Spirit, into five young men, who came from various college campuses around the United States.



As I met with these five men and (Mark) the campus director who discipled me. we sought the Lord to develop us as leaders as we grew in our relationship with Him over the course of the summer. We also made the most of every opportunity we had to reach out to people from all different walks of life on the beach and to many graduating high school seniors from around the nation who were at house parties all

One day while Mark and I were out on the beach doing surveys, we approached a very burly man with a tattoo of the Anheuser Busch logo on his arm as well as various other tattoos on his body. He was forty years old with a wife and four boys who were down at North Myrtle Beach on vacation for the week. When I first asked if he would like to take a survey, he said "Not really... You should ask my boy though!" Since his son kind of ignored his father's comment and walked off to the beach I asked the man again, "Well would you be interested since your son isn't?" This time he said,

was a pretty intelligent and relational guy. He actually coached three sports back at the high school he taught at and had four boys who As we got into a conversation with this man it became clear right away that he was a presty intelligent and readonal gyr. The accounty countries there species back at the ingrescribor ne ranging at any nau roof boys write were apparently really successful wrestlers. As we went through the "Quest Survey" and eventually the "Knowing God Personally Booklet" if was evident that this man was sincerely interested and seeking to find answers to the questions he had struggled with in regards to faith and God. Near the end of our conversation we asked this man if he had ever placed his faith in Jesus for the forgiveness of his sins and accepted Him into his life as Lord and Savior. He acknowledged that he hadn't, but that it was something that he now wanted to do. So there on the beach. Mark, myself and this man all bowed our heads as he prayed to accept Jesus into his life! Before parting ways we gave him resources for further growth and encouraged him to get plugged into a Bible-believing Church back home. We also encouraged him to share the message we had shared with him with his boys. As we left he assured us that it was something he wanted to do.

Throughout the course of the summer 6,345 spiritual conversations were initiated by our staff and students, 2,225 of them leading to a gospel presentations and 250 of them ending with someone accepting Jesus into their life as Lord and Savior. Not only did many people hear the gospel and come to know God personally, but many of the staff and students that were there got developed as leaders through a weekly schedule of Bible studies, weekly meetings, outreaches, project socials and "date nights with Jesus", when they weren't working a full-time job.
