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General Rules:

1. 4-H livestock club members must have passed their 8th birthday but not have passed their 19th birthday by January 1 of the current year.
2. 4H exhibitors must be Adams County 4-H members (registered in zSuite), conducting a project in the field in which they wish to make entry, and be under the supervision of Pennsylvania State University Cooperative Extension Service by May 1 preceding the fair.
3. Students enrolled in an accepted vocational school curriculum must be conducting a project in the class in which they wish to make entry. Students enrolled in Family and Consumer Sciences in a comprehensive high school are considered as qualifying. All entries shall be approved prior to the fair by a member of the Pennsylvania Department of Education, Agriculture or Family and Consumer Sciences staff, or their designated representative.
4. In any case where there is reference to 4-H and vocational classes, the South Mountain Fair Association has the option, if there is a sufficient number of available exhibits, to divide the show into two classes, a 4-H and a vocational, or they may be shown together.
5. 4-H or FFA member must be present and must have charge of his/her animal at the time of judging.
6. 4-H exhibits with project books will be accepted Thursday, July 17, 2025, 4:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. and Friday, July 18, 2025, 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.
7. Premiums will be offered on merit of excellence, not entry alone. Therefore, in any one class all premiums may not be awarded, if in the judge's opinion, the other entries do not merit placement. This may result in the omission of some placements such as first or second for awarding of only a third.
8. **Livestock may not be removed before 10:00 p.m. on Saturday and no vehicles or livestock trailers may go to the barns before 10 pm. All premiums will be forfeited by all exhibitors whose animals are being transported with a vehicle/trailer entering the grounds before 10 pm.**
9. **ALL exhibits in the 4H building will be released to exhibitors after the Fair on Sunday from 2:00-4:00 p.m. No prize money will be awarded for exhibits removed in violation of this rule. No ribbons will be mailed, any unclaimed ribbons will be recycled.**
10. Items in each exhibit must be grown by a 4-H member who is enrolled in the 4-H Fruit/Vegetable project within the current year.

8. **Livestock may not be removed before 10:00 p.m. on Saturday and no vehicles or livestock trailers may go to the barns before 10 pm. All premiums will be forfeited by all exhibitors whose animals are being transported with a vehicle/trailer entering the grounds before 10 pm.**

General Rules:

Entry fee: Free (Sponsored by Farm Credit)

- Individual official animal identification is required for all sheep. Official ID includes: A USDA ear tag with a US shield (US); or a legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear - state postal code and letters/numbers - and individual animal ID in the left ear; or a breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.
- A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) **issued after May 1** is required. Market sheep are exempt from the vaccination requirements.
- Market sheep must be documented on sales slips which contain the following information: 1) Official identification; 2) Sale date; 3) Sale location; 4) Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor; 5) Hauler contact information; 6) Destination name and contact information; 7) Total number of animals in the shipment; 8) Type of sheep (i.e. meat, wool, specific breed); 9) Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler. Those slips must follow the sheep to their destination (including slaughter facilities). A copy of the sale records slips and a copy of the CVI must be kept for 5 years.**
- All livestock must be shown by the exhibitor that it is registered under unless the exhibitor has more than one animal in the class and then one animal must be shown by the registered exhibitor.
- Junior Livestock market sheep must arrive for weigh-in between 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. on Monday July 21, 2025.
- Junior Livestock exhibitors must show proof of 4H or FFA membership by presenting their current up-to-date record book signed by their 4-H leader or FFA advisor to the chairperson at the time of arrival.
- Adams County Junior Livestock members are required to attend Quality Assurance and Ethics training every year to exhibit and/or show.
- Livestock may not be removed before 10:00 p.m. on Saturday and no vehicles or livestock trailers may go to the barns before 10 pm. All premiums will be forfeited by all exhibitors whose animals are being transported with a vehicle/trailer entering the grounds before 10 pm.**
- No extra equipment, feed, hay, bedding, etc. will be allowed to be stored in pens in the barns.
- Market lambs must weigh at least 80 pounds. Each exhibitor is limited to 6 head.

Health Requirements.

Entry fee: Free (Sponsored by Farm Credit)

1. All show swine must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) **issued within 30 days of the Fair.**
2. All swine must be permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI.
3. All swine must have been visually inspected and found to be free of signs of contagious disease immediately prior to unloading at the Fair by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor (SHM) appointed by the Fair Board.

General Rules:

Entry fee: Free (Sponsored by Farm Credit)

- Individual official animal identification is required for all sheep. Official ID includes: A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or a legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear - state postal code and letters/numbers - and individual animal ID in the left ear; or a breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.
- A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI), **issued after May 1 of the current year is required. Market goats are exempt from the vaccination requirements.**
- All livestock must be shown by the exhibitor that it is registered under unless the exhibitor has more than one animal in the class and then one animal must be shown by the registered exhibitor.
- Market goats must weigh between 65-120 pounds, and must have a full set of kid teeth.
- Each exhibitor is limited to 6 head. Entries may be does or wethers.
- Junior Livestock market goats must arrive for weigh-in between 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. on Monday July 21, 2025.
- Junior Livestock market animals may be shown in breeding or market classes but not both.**
- Livestock may not be removed before 10:00 p.m. on Saturday and no vehicles or livestock trailers may go to the barns before 10 pm. All premiums will be forfeited by all exhibitors whose animals are being transported with a vehicle/trailer entering the grounds before 10 pm.**
- The Youth Market Livestock Entry Form can be found at the back of this book or on the Premium Book page on the web site at www.southmountainfair.com and must be returned to the South Mountain Fair by July 6, no exceptions.**
- No equipment, feed, hay, bedding, etc. will be allowed to be stored in pens in the barns. These items must be kept in trailers.
- Market goats must be documented on sales slips with the following information: 1) Official identification, 2) Sale date, 3) Sale location, 4) Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor, 5) Hauler contact information, 6) Destination name and contact information, 6) Total number of animals in the shipment, 7) Type of goat (i.e. meat, dairy, specific breed, 8) Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler. The sales slips must follow the goat to their final destination (including slaughter facilities) A copy of the sales records slips and a copy of any CVI's must be kept for 5 years.**

See General Livestock information.

1. Individual official animal identification. Official ID will have a US shield  and includes: A USDA-issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag; or a 15-digit Animal Identification Number eartag starting with “840”; or other official identification approved by USDA. (Brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable.)

2. **Market cattle are exempt from the vaccination requirements.**

General Rules:

- Each animal must be under halter and under control. and Junior exhibitors should have assistance available.
- All livestock must be shown by the exhibitor that it is registered under unless the exhibitor has more than one animal in the class and then one animal must be shown by the registered exhibitor.
- All feeder calves must have been born between November 15 and January 31 of the current year.
- Dairy beef must arrive for weigh-in between 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. on Monday July 21, 2025.
- Feeder calves must be 100% Holstein. No other breeds or crosses are accepted. Finished steers must be 100% dairy breeding (Holsteins are preferred, but other acceptable breeds are Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Milking Shorthorn, or Jersey). Finished steers may be a crossbreed of dairy breeds.
- Must be dehorned and castrated by 2 months of age.
- Feeder calves must weigh from 500-800 pounds at weigh-in at the Fair. The ideal weight for finished steers is approximately 1,150 to 1,350 pounds. All finished steers must be finished at weigh-in at the Fair.
- 4H and FFA exhibitors are limited to exhibit one dairy feeder calf AND one finished dairy steer; OR two feeder calves; OR one feeder calf OR one finished dairy steer. For questions contact Alexis Lansford at the Extension office.
- Junior Livestock market animals may be shown in breeding or market classes but not both.**
- Livestock may not be removed before 10:00 p.m. on Saturday and no vehicles or livestock trailers may go to the barns before 10 pm. All premiums will be forfeited by all exhibitors whose animals are being transported with a vehicle/trailer entering the grounds before 10 pm.**
